

Save Water in Your Landscape

SUMMERS SEEM TO BE GETTING HOTTER and drier in many parts of our country and, although rain and water cycles fluctuate, we have all the water on our planet that we will ever get. It is essential we conserve what we have, and this winter is a good time to plan changes in your landscape that might help.

Here are three general ways to save water in your yard or business property:

SPACE DESIGN

Convert lawn to mulched areas, decks, patios, or other uses as long as surfaces continue to allow water to permeate into the soil.

VEGETATION SELECTION

Select trees, shrubs, ground covers, and flowering plants that are drought-resistant.

MAINTENANCE METHODS

Use mulch, work your soil to keep it absorptive and aerated, and consider using drip or other water-saving irrigation







Mulch beds, decks, and patios with surfaces that allow water penetration are just some of the ways to reduce watering needs.
