Tour of Missouri Capitol Grounds Highlights Challenges For its Trees

A recent tour and discussion of the trees on the Missouri State Capitol grounds raised interesting questions on future management and potential planting opportunities. Organized by central region MCFC members, the tour on February 19, 2021, earned attending certified arborists 1.5 ISA CEUS.

The tour was led by Bill Ruppert, a St. Louis MCFC member and treasurer of the Missouri Green Industry Alliance. Bill has been spearheading an effort to focus on the trees of the capitol grounds, including most recently working with Skip Kincaid who generously donated his time and services to complete a tree inventory. On the tour, Bill explain some of the challenges and unique circumstances of arboriculture on the capital grounds such as accommodating large gatherings and the need for clear sight lines of the newly refurbished capitol building. The attending members also saw first hand the diminishing effect Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) was having on the canopy cover of the grounds, which lead to a hopeful discussion for a potential planting project on-site. Although plans for this project are incomplete, Bill informed the group that with the state bicentennial date fast approaching there seems to be interest in a



The inventory Skip Kinkaid provided listed 180 trees in a wide variety of tree species. Map below shows placement of the trees, with species color coded to note distribution and number of each.



Renown McBaine Bur Oak Suffers Significant Damage from Lightning Strike

The McBaine Bur oak, an iconic and massive Quercus macrocarpa located near Columbia MO on privately owned Missouri river bottomland, was struck by lightning October 23, 2020, during an early morning thunderstorm. The lightning strike appeared to have to have spared the upper canopy of the tree, however it set the interior of the trunk ablaze requiring the efforts of volunteer firefighters from the Boone County Fire Protection District (BCFPD) to extinguish the fire. Visible damage to the tree includes several scorched vertical cracks on the trunk, in addition to a cavity where a chunk of wood and bark was blown off at the likely site of impact. The cavity had apparently been enlarged slightly by the BCFPD to fight the ensuing fire caused by the lightning. Although unseen from

ground view, the blaze reportedly burned a hollow 10foot section inside the trunk (See photo)

Listed as a Missouri champion bur oak, this tree has an impressive 285-inch trunk circumference, is approximately 74 feet tall with a 129-foot spread. The estimated age of the tree is between 350-400 years old.

This tree has weathered many challenges such as heavy flooding over the years, but in recent decades has shown signs of decline. The continuous practice of sightseers driving vehicles off the road and then under the tree's canopy (see ruts in photo below) has surely contributed to root damage, but likely there are other contributing factors as well.

Many MCFC members will recall that on October 21, 2013, a consortium of concerned arborist, led by Bill Spradley, of the Saint Louis tree care company Trees, Forests, and Landscapes, held a workday to prune and

implement other measures to help preserve this venerable giant. (See workday poster on right) Sadly, one measure, the installation of lightning protection, was shortly rendered useless by desperate thieves who stole the copper grounding cables for quick cash. As a result, seven years later almost to the day, there wasn't any way to protect the tree when calamity struck.

Even with this devasting injury, it is not certain it is all over for the Mcbaine bur oak. On February 26,2021, Bill Spradley returned with his staff of preservation arborists to prune deadwood from the tree and assess its health. This work and a discussion of what lies ahead for the tree was live zoomed and recorded as part of the annual "Mid-MO Expo: Small Farms to Backyard Gardens" hosted by the MU Boone County Extension Council. MCFC Members Follow up with Another Service Project at Springfield Missouri Veterans Cemetery

The trees grown in 3 gal. containers were provided by Forest ReLeaf of Missouri and have thrived since their planting date. Recently, on February 26, 2021, SWMCFC members combined forces to assist the Springfield Missouri Veterans Cemetery with training/pruning of these young trees. The group also did planting bed

maintenance along the Trail of Honor that winds along Lake Springfield. While the actual pruning and maintenance didn't take long to complete, the work will be evident for decades to come in honor of the veterans and their families


